Polo is a game we associate nowadays with maybe Prince William and Harry on horseback. But actually Polo has a quite ancient tradition, with roots also in China. Originating in Persia around or before the 4th century, it quickly became popular in central and East Asia. Already in the Tang Dynasty (618-907 A.D.) Chinese emperors played a game called 'jiju' which shares the key characteristics of modern Polo, namely charging after a ball from horseback, using 'sticks' or, in Polo parlance, 'mallets' . All the 16 monarchs of the Tang Dynasty, from Emperor Zhongzong to Emperor Zhaozong were renowned Jiju enthusiasts, and some were even considered to be highly skilled players. And if the emperor takes up something, others follow suit. Many high-ranking officials even went as far as to create their own Polo fields, not a small undertaking, as its dimensions were 1000 times 100 paces, therefore significantly larger than the modern Polo field of 300 time 160 yards. The field was sprayed with oil, no, not to add an extra dimension of danger and challenge, but to prevent the horses from kicking up dust. A Polo match at the Moonlight Chamber became even a way to celebrate success at the highest imperial examination.

Yet with the end of the Tang Dynasty Polo fell from favour in China. Polo traditions were kept alive in India, especially in Manipur, and re-discovered there by the British. Nowadays the dominant nations are Argentina, the US and Britain.

Only recently Polo has been resurrected in China. Close to Shanghai, the first modern Polo Club in China exists, the 'Nine Dragon Hills Polo Club'. It boasts 300 stable, 2 Polo fields and even equine hospital facilities. The clubs mission is to promote Polo and equestrian sports in China, elevate the sport standard and encourage international equestrian and interpersonal network exchanges.


