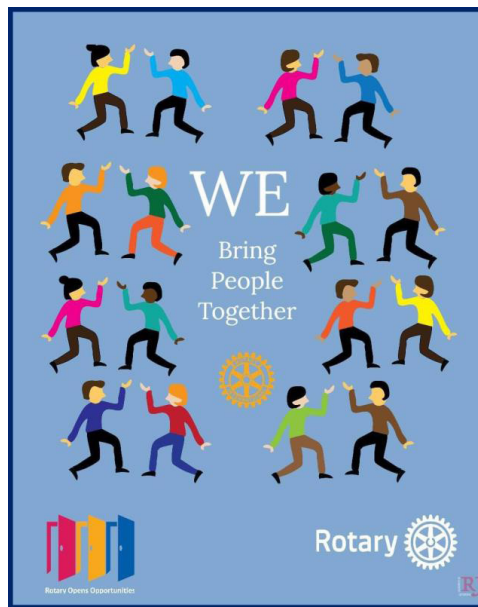

Highlights from Our Fellowship Dinner

@Kunlun

The last meeting took place in our new venue, the Kunlun Hotel, formerly the Hilton. Again we were on the 40th floor, enjoying the glorious view. President Tracy guided us through the proceedings. After Christian read the Four Way Test, we learned about the RC Elysee, the French speaking Club, to whose Charter Dinner on August 31st we are all invited. The Elysee club, introduced by its President, was originally a spin-off of the RCS, started by our former member Alexandra. It was started as a satellite club or a New Zealand French speaking e-club - it is amazing what kind of clubs exist globally. Naturally we all hope for a glorious event on the 31st. Afterwards Rotaract introduced us to the topic of "Personal Inventory". The wish of our Rotaractors is that all Rotarians



provide a personal inventory of experiences and capabilities, so that Rotaractors can easily find mentors or points of contact and reference for their ventures. Definitely an interesting project to which all should contribute. The main speakers of the evening though were from Habitat for Humanity. It may surprise many Rotarians, but in Shanghai even among home owners there is a need for support. Often some home owners in Shanghai received their apartments in the 1990s as government gifts. These buildings and apartments often are in a sorry state of repair and the dwellers, now usually pensioners, do not have the financial resources for the upkeep. Thus while the property is worth millions, the owners live in squalor. Selling and moving out is not an option, as it would be difficult to buy a new apartment in these days of skyrocketing real estate prices. Here Habitat



for Humanity steps in, helping them to reach a basic standard of living conditions. The lively Q&A afterwards highlighted the interest which these topics found with Rotarians.
