



### Highlights from the last speaker meeting

Our meeting began with check-in on our members and friends. ### 1968: Expanding our reach with Rotaract

Happy Anniversary #Rotaract!

The idea for Rotaract emerged in the mid-1960s. As a combination of the words rotary + action, the first Rotaract club was formed at UNCcharlotte, USA on 13 March 1968. Learn more about the history of Rotaract here:

The idea for Rotaract emerged in the mid-1960s, building on the success of Interact, Rotary's service program for young people, which was founded in 1962.



Rotary members were looking for a way to promote Rotary to college students and other young adults who were over the Interact age limit. The answer was Rotaract: a service program for men and women ages 17-25 that would be sponsored by local Rotary clubs. (The age requirement later changed.)

The idea became reality in January 1968 when Rotary approved the Rotaract proposal. Members of the Rotary Club of Charlotte-North, North Carolina, USA, had worked with local university students, and they seized the opportunity to sponsor a Rotaract club. The first Rotaract club was certified by Rotary on 13 March 1968 at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte.

In the weeks that followed, more Rotaract clubs were started in the United States, Mexico, Italy, and India. About a year later, Rotaract boasted more than 200 clubs in over 25 countries and geographic areas.

Early in its second year, Rotaract was featured in a special presentation at the 1969 Rotary International Convention. In a mock courtroom trial designed to explore the question "Is Rotary serving the needs of youth today?" George Lee acted as a witness, giving testimony based on his personal experience as a member of a Rotaract club in the Philippines.

Lee explained to the mock jury that Rotaract clubs serve the community and promote international understanding and goodwill. And that they work with Rotary clubs, but they plan and finance their own service activities. (This remains true of Rotaract today.) Lee's club was working to reduce juvenile delinquency by mentoring local students at risk of dropping out of school. The club members also corresponded with Rotaract members in India, which fostered an international friendship. Rotaract, Lee felt, was accomplishing something worthwhile by providing young people with the experience and training to become leaders.

Today, Rotaract clubs bring together young professionals and students who are committed to service and leadership in their communities and abroad.

Rotaract facts and firsts:

The name "Rotaract" is a blend of the words "Rotary" and "action."

The unofficial Rotaract motto is Fellowship Through Service.

Interota is the only Board-recognized triennial Rotaract conference. It's been hosted in various cities worldwide every three years since the first one in Vanderbijlpark, South Africa, in 1981.

The first Rotaract Preconvention was held in conjunction with the 1989 Rotary International Convention in Seoul, Korea.

World Rotaract Week was first observed in March 1993.

Rotary's 2016 Council on Legislation gave Rotary clubs greater flexibility in the types of membership they offer, including allowing dual membership in Rotary and Rotaract clubs.

Rotary's 2019 Council on Legislation amended the RI Constitution to recognize Rotaract as a membership type in Rotary.







### Interact club of Shanghai Shangde Experimental School

Since our last encounter at Interact night last November, our club has remained actively involved in our many projects. We want to share our long-term engagements, namely supporting Shanghai Young Bakers, organizing Run in SSES, and sharing awareness of Madaifu.

On September 5th, our club visited the Shanghai Young Bakers' base to learn how to make apple pie and cake. SYB is a charity program that provides free French-baking training to marginalized Chinese youth aged 17 to 23. We collaborated with SYB before, but this baking experience allowed us to learn from the bakers. They taught us how to use a kitchen and techniques for our upcoming Madaifu activity. We enjoyed conversing about the bakers' goals after graduation and reflecting on our futures. Our desserts we delicious, and we would love to make this an annual experience that connects us.



Organized by the Rotaract Club Of Shanghai since 2014, Run In Blue is an Annual 5km Fun Run supporting children's health. We were excited about hosting this run at our school again because it would support Rotaract and RCS through the GOL project. Unfortunately, due to the ongoing epidemic, Run in Blue 2021 could not be held in SSES. Still, our Interact club received and packed the runner's kits, and we took on the challenge of hosting an internal fun run - Run in SSES! We could only host 50 participants, but we had a great time with quizzes and family.






After our baking lesson at SYB, we purchased six boxes of apples from Madaifu in December. We used them to make a simple sweet treat and fresh apple juice, which we sold to teachers and students. We engaged volunteers who later applied to be members! We also highlighted the significance of Madaifu as a way of helping kids like us during the sale process. We used the earnings to purchase winter gloves for the children of Madaifu as a New Year gift.











Also in December, our club and the rest of our Student Leadership Initiative had an eye-opening session with Rotarian Tilman Rieger. He introduced us to Transactional analysis, a tool used to improve communication. As young leaders, we discovered how challenging it is to communicate effectively when you don't consider others. We look forward to more sessions with Rotarian Tilman, and with Rotarian Rita, who spoke to some of us about leadership and management last year.



Overall, we are proud of the financial contributions we have made. Still, the real value for us has been finding out how our interests and subjects, and the training RCS provides can better prepare us to help our community.



During our August to December tenure, Dulwich College Shanghai Pudong Interact team was able to work on, and complete a wide variety of projects. We held our One Voice conference in September 2021 which is a 2 day conference where we invite students from other schools to learn about discuss topics relating to UN SDGs. The themes were:

- 1. Animal Life/Rights Challenge: How can our actions better support human life?
- 2. Diversity Challenge: How can we bring about a better world of inclusivity and understanding?

We also continued to put out our weekly "GC journal" to the community to educate on a different global issue each edition. We also held workshops during "Sustainable November" including a Clothes Swap, animal origami and sustainable deodorant making to inform students on how they can be sustainable in their everyday lives. We were also able to collaborate and raise funds for Shanghai Young Bakers, through connecting with Rotary members, at our Winter Concert in December and during some Senior School breaks.









### Interact club of Shanghai American School Puxi

The Interact team of Shanghai American School Puxi, under rather straining circumstances, has struggled to uphold the values of service established by both Rotary and the Service Committee of SAS. COVID cases have never been more prevalent, and as a student-led organization, we were and still are governed under school-established pandemic regulations. Hence, it has presented significant limitations in the decisions we were allowed to make as a service club.

Though we were unable to host offline events that aim to stimulate a direct difference, there was a multitude of options we could still choose from that would bring forth greater difference for the better. SAS Interact, therefore, launched a new project that revolves around an often unilluminated area of service — service learning.

Service Learning is an educational approach in which students are taught the ways of combining community service and their lives outside the classroom, in order to provide a societal basis for future progressive activism. The SAS Interact Team concluded that it was critical to give teenagers an opportunity to explore the possibilities of service and clarify what we can achieve with a little bit of active awareness.

While writing newsletter articles that center around such themes was an effective approach, we sought ways to more directly get in touch with the rest of the school. We needed a physical location, best if frequented by students, and some display space available for use. The library, the treasure house of unacquainted knowledge, was a perfect candidate.

The Librarian, Mr. Duvoisin, delightfully accepted our proposition. We immediately worked in tandem with the library faculty to create a list of books that students may find some inspiration in. The list of books includes: Born A Crime: Stories from a South African Childhood by Trevor Noah, Youth to Power by Jamie Margolin, and I am Malala by Malala Yousafzai. These books are planned to be on display as soon as Mr. Duvoisin returns. The SAS Interact has also organized a team of designers to design some visuals that will also go with the list of recommended books, hopefully attracting a greater number of passers-by. Furthermore, we have created a website that accumulates a variety of resources one can utilize to learn the values of service — an easily accessible QR-code will be placed right next to the shelf to facilitate research and participation.

Next, the SAS Interact club will attempt to expand our boundaries, and collaborate with other service clubs to more readily achieve our goal to promote service and service-learning.
