

US-CHINA RELATIONS: A PERSONAL AND GEOPOLITICAL PERSPECTIVE FROM A CHINESE-AMERICAN

Last week, I was amazed by an occurrence that I had not seen before, a panic to register for an online rotary meeting because of limited slots available. I then remembered who the speaker for the event was going to be and everything fell into place. I am not the quickest RSVP person you will meet so I flew into a panic and locked in my seat for the weekly RCS meeting.



Our speaker was Frank Tsai who is the Founder of China Crossroads. The title of his talk was very intriguing, "Us-China Relations: A personal and geopolitical perspective from a Chinese American". Hmm, sounds very interesting, but the enticements did not stop there. Like a syllabus for a political science class at an Ivy League school, we were told what Frank would cover. Tensions - Misunderstandings - Misconceptions - Oh My. This was what we needed to hear for a better perspective. Given the lofty and wide ranging assortment of take-aways, I was a bit concerned that 20 minutes would not be enough time. I was pleasantly surprised that Frank covered all that was promised and more!

Frank began the speech with a powerful thesis on the similarities of the Chinese and US values as products of revolutionary beginnings. If that would not grab the listener, what would right? He went on with some sharp observations and connected many areas where we are also quite dissimilar. The narrative was smart, to the point and created a huge amount of ideas and big questions in my head.



When Frank was done, being a polite person who was respecting the time frame he was given, people were upset that he stopped. "Keep going" I thought to myself and I assume everyone else was in agreement with me on this point. President Rita then officiated the tsunami of digitally raised hands with very intelligent questions from the participants. Frank gave very respectful and in-depth answers and everyone was looking at their clocks thinking, "Why do we need to stop?" Thankfully, Frank is not the type of person to run away from questions.

New Mentor Session planned for 31 May 2022 – Chinese speaking Mentors needed!

On 31 May 2022 the Rotary Club Shanghai is organizing another Career Empowerment Program. It will be the third time this year and the aim is to let Rotarians have a one-hour mentoring conversation with students of mainly those organizations that Rotary supports (e.g. Shanghai Young Bakers or Shanghai Sunrise). During these (currently online) Mentor-Mentee Sessions the Mentor will invite the Mentee to share a professional career aspiration, a dream they have or a challenge that they face in their current life (e.g. struggling with self-discipline or time-management).



Before the session all Rotarian mentors receive a one-hour training on how to best create trust, rapport, and a safe environment that can bridge the generation and hierarchy gap between Mentor and Mentee. The mentors learn how to best structure such a conversation with the so-called GROW model (G=Goal, R=Reality, O=Options, W=Wrap up) and learn to ask open thought-provoking questions. During the Mentor-Mentee Session the Mentors may also share their experience and inspire the students with their wisdom, but it is considered even more important to give Mentees the opportunity to self-reflect based on their Mentor's great questions and ideally find their own solution and way to meet a challenge.



The get-together of Mentor and Mentee also serves the purpose of giving Rotarians a chance to not only support the organization with their money but to also contribute with their personally acquired professional skills and life experience. This in itself is a highly rewarding experience during which Rotarians will be able to learn from the younger generation's perspective on life and will be positively challenged in creating trust, emotional safety, and connection in a short time, a skill that many leaders can highly benefit from. For most students the

opportunity of speaking to someone much more senior while being taken seriously and respected at eye-level is an important experience in developing self-confidence and losing fear of being around more senior people. Furthermore, the students/mentees ideally leave such a Mentor session with an important takeaway and an action item to go for in the days after the session.



As most students that would be invited to join as Mentees only speak Chinese, it is important to find enough Mentors who are fluent in Chinese so that the conversation can also be conducted in Chinese.



The Mentor training is a recorded Zoom session that will be made available to any new mentors that did not have the chance to join the original Zoom Training-Session end of 2021. If you are interested in becoming a Mentor on 31 May, especially if you also speak Chinese, then please contact Tilman, Rita, Naomy, or Elizabeth.
