Ioana Kraft has served as General Manager of the Shanghai Chapter of the European Union Chamber of Commerce in China (European Chamber) since October 2009. She is responsible for implementation and development of European Chamber objectives, visibility, membership and lobbying activities on a regional level in Shanghai and neighbouring regions. Ioana is also a member of the Management Committee of the European Chamber and involved in the overall strategic planning of European Chamber Government Affairs activities at national level, including annual Position Papers, Business Confidence Surveys and other Chamber publications.

Since 2004 she held different positions in the European Chamber including National Director, Government Affairs, responsible for overall planning and implementation of the Government Affairs strategy and Working Group administration at national level. She was also National Lead for the IPR Working Group of the Chamber and has managed two IPR-related EU Projects.

A German-qualified lawyer, Ioana practiced with a German law firm in Shanghai from 2003 and 2004 focussing on foreign direct investment, Insurance Law and IPR.

Ioana holds a PhD degree in law from Heinrich Heine University, Düsseldorf, where she also worked from 1999 to 2003 as a Senior Research Assistant focussing on the areas of Civil Law, Insurance Law, Comparative Law, International Private Law and Labour Law.

From 1997 to 1998 she trained as a lawyer with the Essen District Court, Essen Labour Court in Germany and the German Embassy in Caracas/Venezuela

Ioana speaks English, German, French, Romanian, Spanish and Mandarin Chinese.

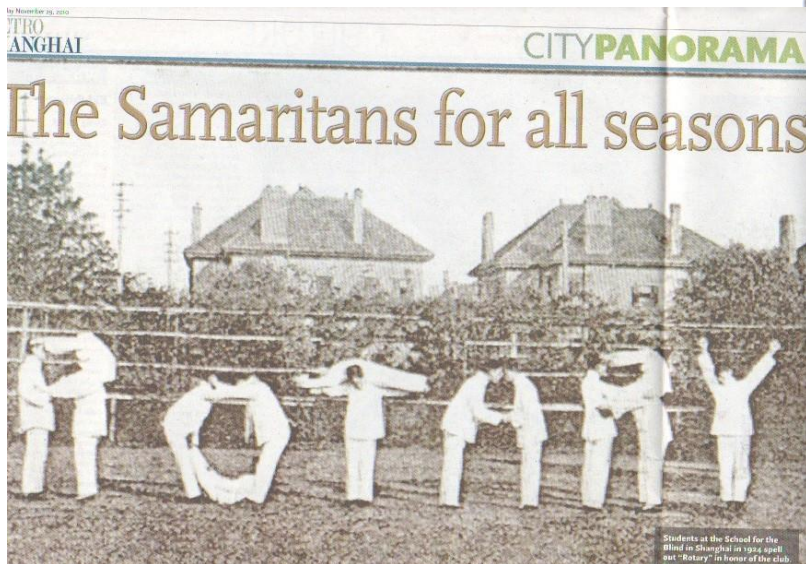
Rotary Club of Shanghai West Gala

► Founded over 90 years ago, Rotary Shanghai continues to make a difference

Seven years ago when Wang Li returned to her hometown in Xuyi for a visit. Her grandmother had bought fireworks and candy and gathered all her neighbors to celebrate her return. The 61-year-old had been given a second chance: she would be able to attend school for the first time and live like a normal girl.  
Wang had never been to school before that time because of a congenital heart condition. The condition made her so weak that from the age of three months until she was 10 years old she was carried everywhere by her mother. "I really wanted to go to school as a way to repay my mother. She now has pain in her waist and I think it's because she carried me around so much," Wang told the Global Times.

Before the celebration in her hometown, Wang was in Shanghai receiving life-saving open heart surgery. Wang and asked for eight hours for their life-saving operation. Her mother accompanied her to Shanghai too and before the operation she had tears in her eyes. "Another son from my village also received open heart surgery and suffered some internal bleeding after the operation," Wang said. "I wasn't scared though. I don't know where the courage came from but I said to my mother, 'If you don't try, I promise I will come back from my surgery safe and sound.'"  
Wang is one of the 260 children

gave a second chance by Gift of Life, a community service program organized by Rotary Shanghai. Wang's parents first heard about the program through a neighbor who was a nurse report about it. "We first my father was skeptical about whether they could help us as we are such a poor family, but I begged him. I said, 'I want to live, why don't we just give Dad a try?'" Wang said.  
After the six-hour surgery, Wang felt as though she had just received a new life. "It feels so good to be as healthy as a normal person," Wang said. "Before the operation, I had to stop to rest after just a few steps." Wang is now 21 and is the mother of a 5-month-old child.

has helped 260 children through its flagship project Gift of Life by paying for the patients' heart surgeries after evaluating their health and financial needs. Aside from that, Rotary Shanghai has also spearheaded several other projects. "Overall from 1999 to 2009 Rotary International clubs have spent about \$17 million plus countless hours of volunteers' time in providing help in the fields of education like the construction of primary schools, scholarships, health and medical support. About \$22 million was spent on polio eradication including building a polio vaccine production plant in Kunming," said Pradeep Kumar, the current president of Rotary Shanghai. In conjunction with the World Health Organization, UNICEF and the US Center for Disease Control, Rotary International has been a leader in the fight to eradicate the world of polio.  
Another project that has seen much success in China is Stop Pediatric Aids Now (SPAN) which was initially launched in Hubei Province in 2005 and has now expanded to Yunnan Province. "We went to a county in Yunnan, just

near the Myanmar border, which had the highest HIV infection rate in China," Yih said. "Our results there were better than worldwide statistics." Rotary tested more than 30,000 newlyweds, educated local communities and administered medicine to help stop the spread of the disease. Originally the rate for mothers passing the virus on to children was 30 percent; now, through Rotary's efforts, the rate is less than a percent. Rotary has also improved education in rural areas in China, through the Shin Shin Foundation and provided clean water for people in Ningxia Hui Autonomous Region among other projects.

**International relations**  
"We are working on replicating the cataract surgery model of the Aravind Eye Hospital of India in Guizhou and Yunnan provinces and Chongqing Municipality," Kumar told the Global Times. "The project is self-sustaining and does not rely on donations." Part of the project educates locals on how the procedure works. "There are people in Guizhou Province who believe that it is natural to go blind at 50 or 60," Yih said. Aravind Eye Hospital has reduced the price of the cataract surgery from a worldwide average of \$100 per operation to \$50 and is training doctors in the operations.  
The current Rotary Shanghai president Pradeep Kumar first joined Rotary in 1990. "The organization makes you feel like an international citizen. You go to a new country and attend a Rotary club and you feel like family," Kumar said. "Where ever there is a need we will come and help. The underlying theme of Rotary is that it is not about politics or religion."

Although Rotary membership on the Chinese mainland is limited to non-PRC passport holders, the club has touched many people in China and locals are allowed to attend meetings as observers.  
"Watching the smile on the face of Gift of Life parents after a successful operation on their child is always a proud moment for me," Kumar said.  
According to Michael Zhang, a Rotary observer, about five to 10 local observers regularly attend Rotary Shanghai meetings. "I have attended several meetings and they have always been very relaxed and friendly. I attended one meeting after the earthquake in Haiti. People were very happy to donate money to help," Zhang said.

"We always ask ourselves whether what we are doing will build goodwill and friendship and be beneficial to all," said Kumar. "The theme for this year is building communities and bridging continents, which is what Rotary is all about."

Constructing a wheel to bear a big cart

Established in Chicago in 1905, Rotary International is the world's oldest social service organization and has 12 million members and more than 35,000 clubs in 200 countries. It has no political or religious leanings and relies on the financial donations and time of its members to implement social services and programs throughout the world. Its motto is "Service above self."  
Shanghai's Rotary Club was founded in 1916 at the Palace Hotel, now the Swatch Art Peace Hotel. According to current Rotary Shanghai president Pradeep Kumar, from 1916 to 1945 the club "supported many worthy and substantial humanitarian projects in Shanghai that were well regarded within the community."

Of the projects that Shanghai Rotary supported in its early days, some of the more notable examples include School for the Blind, a program to improve conditions of child labor in the mills and the Rotary Mobile Clinic. In 1937, when Shanghai was invaded by the Japanese, Rotary Shanghai began a relief drive. By the end of the club had raised \$10,000 and another \$20,000 was donated by clubs from other countries.

To deal with the influx of refugees in the last months of 1937 the French Concession's population grew to 1.5 million residents from 450,000. Rotary Shanghai set up an emergency hospital and a mobile clinic and dispensary as well as providing support for an emergency maternity hospital and shelter for over 1,000 refugees. The club also handed out gifts to 2,700 children living in refugee camps on Christmas day.  
The club included mem-

bers from many countries including China and Japan. However, as the war escalated, Rotary Shanghai stopped meeting in 1941 because of financial and transport difficulties. When the war ended in 1945, Rotarians tried to start the club again. "Initially it was quite difficult for many of the surviving Rotarians to meet but they made efforts to do so and it appears that by 1948 Rotary was experiencing a bit of a renaissance in China—with four clubs being chartered that year," Kumar said.

With the founding of the People's Republic of China in 1949, social welfare became the responsibility of the government. Because of the political climate it also became increasingly harder for club members to meet and in 1955 the club disbanded. "At that time non-governmental organizations were considered counter-revolutionary. Furthermore, foreign business persons were considered to represent imperialist capitalism, a form of economic invasion of China," Kumar said.

In June 1997 and early 1998 Rotarians began to meet again at the Hilton Hotel and by 1999 formal meetings were established. After donating funds to various causes, in late 2000 Rotary Shanghai began its first long-term social service project, Gift of Life. In 2005 Rotary Shanghai once again received club status.

The Percy Chu Scholarship



Perhaps one of the most well-known and loved members of Rotary Shanghai was former Rotary Shanghai president Percy Chu. Born in Hangzhou in 1908, Chu studied economics in the US and returned to China in the 1940s to become one of China's most powerful bankers. From 1934 to 1935 he served as president of the Rotary Club in Shanghai and at 36 was the youngest president in Rotary History.

In 1950 Chu was accused of being "anti-revolutionary" and sentenced to 12 years manual labor in a cotton mill factory. While he worked in the cotton mill factory he was being consulted by top party cadres on trading and finance issues.  
When China reopened its doors to the world, members from Taiwanese Rotary clubs tracked the then 55-year-old down and he

was invited to attend a Rotary International convention in Taipei. According to long-time Rotarian Frank Yih, this speech brought the house down. "Not only was he possibly the last surviving member of the Shanghai Rotary Club but also the last person alive who had met Rotary founder Paul Harris."

Chu passed away in 2001 at the age of 102 but in honor of Chu's lifetime devotion to Rotary the Percy Chu scholarship was created. "When we started the project we wanted to give more than money, we wanted to cultivate young leaders, who are responsible for themselves and society," Cheah Kim Foe, head of the Percy Chu Scholarship committee, said.  
Candidates for the scholarship are final-year undergraduate students who are judged on their community service record, financial need, and career goals (unlike other scholarships less attention is paid to their academic achievements). Recipients of the scholarship receive 5,000 yuan (\$743.90) and the opportunity to take part in a Leadership Development program.

Cui Jiali is one of the 15 students to receive the Percy Chu scholarship this year. Cui is a final year student at Shanghai International Studies University and organized a team of 24 volunteers to work at an elementary school in Guyuan, Ningxia Hui Autonomous Region last summer. "I found the training very helpful. It encouraged me to set goals and to also influence more people to do good for society," Cui said.
